

In partnership with the Fonds de Recherche du Québec - secteur Santé, Clinical Trials Training Programs (CTTPs) Award \$473,500 to 18 Graduate and Postdoctoral Awardees Across Québec

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Montréal, QC - The Canadian Consortium of Clinical Trial Training, CANTRAIN, in partnership with <u>CAN-TAP-TALENT</u> - the Canadian Training Platform Leveraging Existing Networks, CBITN – the Canadian Behavioural Interventions & Trials Network, and STROKECOG Platform - Innovative Clinical Trials Training Initiatives for STROKE and COGnition. has successfully concluded а successful CTTP Studentship/Fellowship Awards Program 2024-25 Competition. Together, over \$2.1 million in funding, including co-funding from several Provinces, has been awarded to a total of 87 trainees across Canada – with 46 from CANTRAIN, 20 from CBITN, 16 from CAN-TAP-TALENT and 5 from STROKECOG platform.

A total of 18 awards were announced for the Province of Québec – with 11 from CANTRAIN (4 Master's, 5 Doctoral, and 2 Postdoctoral), 5 from CBITN (2 Master's, 2 Doctoral, and 1 non-top up Doctoral), and 1 from each of CAN-TAP-TALENT (1 Doctoral) and STROKECOG (1 Postdoctoral). With \$217,500 in co-funding support from the Fonds de recherche du Québec – secteur Santé, these 18 awards represent a total investment of \$473,500 in clinical trials training in the Province of Québec, through 15 studentships and 3 fellowships.

"By supporting the training of the next generation of clinical researchers, we are not only contributing to the development of highly qualified and agile talent, but also strengthening the competitiveness of clinical research in Quebec. This commitment is a direct response to the objectives of the Québec Life Sciences Strategy 2022-2025, which aims to position Québec as a key player on the international life sciences scene."

In addition to financial support, all awardees will have access to support from mentors through CANTRAIN's mentorship program "CANTRAIN Connect" and CANTRAIN's expanding offering of online learning modules. Awardees also receive an all-expense paid opportunity to participate in the 2025 Clinical Trials Training Summit – to be held in February 2025 at The Fairmont Hotel, Vancouver. The Awards Program for Graduate and Postdoctoral Training in Clinical Trials was coordinated by CANTRAIN in collaboration with the partnering CTTPs, from applications to review and decisions.
